

Aim of the CSC – EDIC

Implement a multi-country project in cybersecurity skills, with the following objectives & tasks:

Design and deliver cybersecurity training courses based on Member States' needs

Create career pathways for cybersecurity careers

Provide on-the-job cybersecurity training courses and traineeships opportunities

Develop a long-term data collection methodology to measure the cybersecurity skills gap, feeding into Digital Decade policy

Develop and implement a cybersecurity certification based on ENISA's European Cybersecurity Skills Framework Develop cybersecurity learning microcredentials

Create accessible online training resources

Grow and improve cybersecurity pledges made by industry

Endorsed Cybersecurity Skills Academy DEP Projects – (AKADIMOS, CADMUS) The National Cyber Security Authority of Greece (NCSA) has strengthened support to the European Commission's Cybersecurity Skills Academy initiative by serving as the consortium coordinator for two emblematic projects under the Digital Europe Programme's DIGITAL-2023-SKILLS-05-CYBERACADEMY call.

CADMUS project

The project tackles the cybersecurity skills shortage in Europe by developing targeted training programs, including cyber range projects, games, hackathons, bootcamps, and traineeships. It aims to upskill educators, trainers, SME employees, civil servants, and graduate students, enhancing existing cybersecurity training initiatives and contributing to a stronger workforce that meets sector-specific and legislative needs.

AKADIMOS project

The project supports the creation of the European Cybersecurity Skills Academy to centralize and enhance cybersecurity training across the EU. It aims to close the skills gap by coordinating stakeholders, avoiding redundant efforts, supporting the European Cybersecurity Skills Framework, and developing tools and systems to monitor and scale impactful training initiatives. The Academy is envisioned to become the central ecosystem for cybersecurity professionals in the EU.

Why an EDIC as a means of implementation

- Concrete coordination structures needed at implementation level
- EDIC: Implementing Mechanism, not a policy mechanism
- Central coordination via EDIC as multi-country project
- Coordinate implementation across Academia, Research Institutions, and Businesses
- EDIC as an Executive Arm of mandate
- Participation of EDIC in DEP proposals
- Inadequacy of ad hoc consortia for skills gap
- Need for additional implementation structures at lower levels
- Create synergies and avoid scattered efforts, overlapping and duplication of effort
